**Principal,** Gaskill Preparatory School, Niagara Falls

As Principal of Gaskill Preparatory School, Sheila is responsible for the management and implementation of district and state policies, regulations, and procedures. At the building-level, she oversees scheduling, curriculum and professional development, personnel management, emergency and facility operations. In addition, she is responsible for evaluations and oversees all school-wide instructional, data, financial, and student services and systems. Sheila also serves as district-wide administrator for the district's English and Language Arts Curriculum Committee.

From 2000-2010, Smith served as classroom teacher, Magnet School Theme Specialist; Director of Community (Adult) Education Center; Dean of Students; Math /Science Partnership Director, and as a Vice-Principal. From 2010-2015 served as Principal of Hyde Park Elementary School. Sheila has a M.S. in Educational Administration and Elementary Education from Niagara University and a B.S degree in Industrial Labor Relations from Cornell University.

# **GB:** Why did you join the Board?

**SS:** Given my background in education, I have always been interested in looking at the full spectrum of education; meaning Kindergarten through post-secondary grades and the interdependence there is on one another. It is interesting to see the common trends and themes that transcend from K-12 and impact post-secondary education. These themes include ensuring academic readiness for all students, student access to the proper tools that will make them the most successful, and preparing students for global competitiveness which is one of the major tenets of Common Core.

# **GB:** What is your greatest accomplishment?

**SS:** To this point in my life, it is being a parent. Being a parent allows me to have special insight into situations with my students. I see them from a holistic perspective. I look at my students pluralistically, through the lens of a practitioner that is teaching them academically and cognitively, and also through the lens of a parent that can teach and relate to them from a social and emotional place as it relates to my experiences with my family. I can listen with understanding and empathy.

As a member of the NCCC Board of Trustees, my greatest accomplishment is seeing the Niagara Falls Culinary Institute come to fruition and what a wonderful asset it has been for the city of Niagara Falls and Niagara County. There are many people that worked very hard to make NFCI a reality; it could not have been done without the former and current Board of Trustees and certainly without the leadership of Dr. Klyczek.

# GB: What do you feel is NCCC's greatest selling point, and why?

**SS:** There is such a wealth of academic programs available for students just starting out on their college path or those that are looking for a new career. NCCC keeps its pulse on the community by offering relevant degree programs that are in demand today, such as culinary arts, winery operations, biotechnology and digital media.

# **GB:** What is your favorite part of commencement, and why?

**SS:** I love seeing the students walk across the stage to reach one of the most important milestones in their lives. As a college student, finishing their program and graduating is one of the most important indicators of future success. It means you have learned to be organized, stayed focused, and prioritized. You have learned new leadership skills, balanced work with home responsibilities, improved interpersonal skills, honed your emotional intelligence and learned team work.



# NIAGARA FALLS CULINARY INSTITUTE NOMINATED FOR BELLWETHER AWARD

NCCC was selected as one of 10 finalists among 1,000 community colleges, for the prestigious 2015 Bellwether Awards in the category of Workforce Development for its program entitled: Retail Partnership Preparing an Educated and Experienced Workforce at the Niagara Falls Culinary Institute (NFCI).

President James P. Klyczek and other College stakeholders presented NFCI's forward-thinking program model to the Community College Futures Assembly and a national panel of judges in Orlando, Florida. "Niagara County Community College is honored to be recognized by the Community College Futures Assembly for the contribution that the Niagara Falls Culinary Institute has made to the revitalization of the city's downtown," said President Klyczek.

The Community College Futures Assembly, convenes annually as an independent national policy forum for key opinion leaders to serve as a think tank in identifying critical issues facing the future of community colleges, and to recognize Bellwether Finalist colleges as trend-setting institutions.

# NIAGARA COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND SUNY EMPIRE STATE COLLEGE OFFER PATHWAY TO BACHELOR'S DEGREE

NCCC President James P. Klyczek and SUNY Empire State College President Merodie A. Hancock announced in October that the colleges are partnering to offer students at Niagara Falls Culinary Institute (NFCI) a pathway to earn a B.S. in business, management and economics, with a concentration in culinary management, from Empire State College (ESC).



NCCC PTA Program only NYS College to have

100% Pass Rate

on National PTA Licensing Exam

The 2015 graduates of the NCCC Physical Therapy Assistant program earned a 100 percent pass rate on the National Physical Therapy Assistant Examination (NPTE). The NCCC program is the only college in New York State with 100 percent pass rate on the national exam. The NPTE is the licensure examination to practice. The New York state average of first-time test takers was 92 percent, while the national average was 86 percent.

"I congratulate the Physical Therapy Assistant Program Coordinators Professor Susan Wehling and Professor Deborah K. Matuch, the PTA faculty, staff and students for their commitment to excellence," said Dr. James P. Klyczek, NCCC President.

# CRIMINAL JUSTICE STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN MOCK TRIAL

Each May, Criminal Justice Professor James A. Mezhir sets up and structures a mock trial just like a real court, bound by the same rules to help his Criminal Law & Procedures (CRJ102) students learn about the roles that different people play in the judicial system. Students role play lawyers, witnesses, defendant, plaintiff, bailiff, and members of the jury. Six students sat on the jury to decide on the charge of arson in the second degree and rendered the not guilty verdict after all of the evidence was presented. "Participating in a mock court room trial, students develop critical thinking and public speaking skills, as well as a knowledge of legal practices and procedures" according to Professor Mezhir.

For the past fifteen years, NCCC Psychology Professor, Dr. Kathleen Gerbasi has invited "esteemed visiting" Professors Huckleberry, Dooley, Monty and Curly (all members of the species canis familiaris) to her PSY110 class to demonstrate examples of classical and operant conditioning. She has found that her students learn much better by having real live (and somewhat unpredictable) examples in class, than by rather dry textbook examples.

The dogs lick their lips at the sight of the whipped cream can demonstrating classical conditioning. As for operant learning, that is voluntary and based on reinforcement and punishment. This was demonstrated with a hula hoop, doing puzzles and running to the sound of the clicker all over the classroom. Monty, Curly, and Huckleberry ran to the sound of the clicker to get treats (positive reinforcement). In a true demonstration of operant conditioning, Dooley, the oldest dog, preferred to nap or get petted, rather than run around and get treats.



# **BASEBALL**

The highly-successful baseball program had another strong year as Coach Matt Clingersmith's crew won 31 games and advanced to the Region III Division III Final Four. The team's pitching staff, led by freshman right-hander Matt Matre, was dominant. Matre picked up First Team All-Region III honors after going 6-1 with a 2.42 ERA and 55 strikeouts. # **WOMEN'S LACROSSE**

With a young roster, the women's lacrosse team, led by Coach Sarah Kirchberger, battled through a winless season. NCCC was led by First Team All-WNYAC selection Kailey Dougherty, who anchored the team's defense in front of goalkeeper Victoria Stevenson. A Second Team All-WNYAC choice. Stevenson finished the year with over 100 saves, putting her among the leaders in Region III despite playing just eight games.

# **MEN'S LACROSSE**

Coach **Todd Faddoul's** men's lacrosse team's season was highlighted by a 14-10 home victory over Hudson Valley Community College. First Team All-WNYAC goalkeeper **Nick Garlock** stood on his head, stopping over 200 shots during the course of the season.
