
Commemorative Flag Tribute for Veterans' Day:

How far would you go to stand up for what you believe in? How should good people who disagree on fundamentals interact in a democracy? Kramer's movie presents the dramatized controversy of the Scopes "Monkey" trial, a case that still seems relevant. Stellar performances by Spencer Tracy and Fredric March (the actor whom Marlon Brando admired above all others) are standouts, but other casting choices offer surprises, too.
